Funded through the Higher Education Innovation Fund/NWDA and supported by Manchester Knowledge Capital, the project is run by the Manchester Metropolitan University through the Manchester Institute for Research and Innovation in Art and Design (MIRIAD), and is intended to launch discussions and identify possible future collaborative projects to bring the work of Scientists and Artists closer together.

In an increasingly democratised knowledge landscape, in part due to new connectivity and dissemination provided by the Internet, MIRIAD plays the perfect host for this project,

Examples of successful collaborations will be presented and the debate will concentrate on practical and pragmatic suggestions for how to maximise the opportunities for collaborative transdisciplinary investigation.
